

KEYNOTE SPEAKERS



A.J. MADA

A.J. Mada serves as the Equity Coaching Academy Director at the USC Race and Equity Center. In this role, he works with higher education institutions, businesses, nonprofit organizations, and government agencies to develop and deliver curriculum, strategy advising, training, coaching, and consulting on a wide range of DEI topics. While obtaining his MBA at the University of Southern California Marshall School of Business, A.J. served two years as the Marshall Graduate Student Association's Vice President of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion. His higher education journey began at Fullerton College before transferring to the University of Alabama, where he earned a bachelor's degree in business. Before assuming his current position in the USC Race and Equity Center, A.J. spent many years in marketing and managerial roles at AT&T. He is deeply passionate about fighting discrimination and creating pathways of opportunity for those who have been systematically denied them through unjust practices. In his free time, A.J. enjoys being active, watching a wide range of sports, and spending time with his family. He is on the team for Takeoff, a multiyear initiative funded by ECMC Foundation that aims to improve the lives, experiences, and outcomes of college men of color.



DR. SHAUN HARPER


Dr. Shaun Harper is one of the nation's most highly respected experts on boys and men of color. He is a Provost Professor in the Rossier School of Education and the Marshall School of Business at the University of Southern California. In 2022, he was appointed University Professor, a distinction bestowed only to 27 of 4,700 USC full-time faculty members. Dr. Harper also is the Clifford and Betty Allen Chair in Urban Leadership, founder and executive director of the USC Race and Equity Center, and a Forbes contributor. He served as the 2020-21 American Educational Research Association president and the 2016-17 Association for the Study of Higher Education president. He was inducted into the National Academy of Education in 2021. His 12 books include Advancing Black Male Student Success from Preschool Through Ph.D. He also has authored over 100 peer-reviewed journal articles and other academic papers, as well as nearly 100 essays published on CNN.com and in The Washington Post, Los Angeles Times, Rolling Stone, Chronicle of Higher Education, and many other news outlets. The recipient of dozens of top honors in his field and four honorary degrees, Professor Harper is currently ranked the nation's 4th most influential professor in Education Week.

Developing Strategic Partnerships with Community Colleges

This session will discuss the benefits of developing strategic partnerships with local community colleges, in particular those with Male Success Initiatives. While a majority of MSIs within the CSU system focus on first year/first time in college students, the presenters discuss the need to engage with and support community college students and future transfer students. Presenters will review strategies used to develop Cal Poly Pomona's Transfer Success and Men of Color Transfer Day to support community college students. Additionally, attendees will engage in discussions about current practices and identify promising strategies that can create bridges for men of color from community college to Cal State campuses and beyond. Additionally, attendees will engage in discussions about supporting transfer students post-transfer and the need to create transfer components within MSIs at CSU Campuses.

This will happen by recognizing the power of storytelling and coupling that with innovative resourcefulness. Students will have the opportunity to network, develop a sense of professional and personal self, and redefine what it means to be a man of color for themselves.

We will close the exercise with a somatic scanning and evaluation of the feelings sparked by the call and response activities.

Asian Pacific Islander (API) males continue to be clumped together under the monolithic and misleading Model Minority Myth which purports that all API groups have higher college success rates (i.e., transfer & degree obtainment). However disaggregated data shows that certain populations such as Southeast Asian, Pacific Islander, and Filipino males are atrisk. Join us to hear from a panel of students from different life journeys and in different stages of their academic paths. Learn how they persisted and resisted problematic stereotypes and demonstrated academic promise despite all odds.

Adrian H. Huerta

Adrian H. Huerta is an Assistant Professor of Education at the USC Pullias Center for Higher Education. At USC, Dr. Huerta studies boys and men of color across the K-16 educational pipeline, college access and (in)equity, and gang-involved populations. His work has been generously funded by the ECMC Foundation, the U.S. Department of Education, JPB Foundation/ IRP, and more. He earned his Ph.D. and M.A. in education from UCLA and is currently a Postdoctoral Fellow with the National Academy of Education/Spencer Foundation.



Alejandro Banuelos

Alejandro Banuelos grew up in Eagle Rock, Los Angeles, and fell in love with his community while studying Black Studies at Northwestern University, located in a north suburb of Chicago. He is currently organizing with Brothers, Sons, Selves, a Black and Brown coalition of eight community organizations based in LA County. He works with boys and men of color to develop their political consciousness to forge worlds without policing and prisons. Alejandro anchors his organizing in the ethics of abolition and decolonization.



Anibal Serrano

Anibal Serrano (he/él) is from South Central Los Angeles, a first-generation scholar, an alumnus of the California State University system, and a son of working-class Mexican immigrants. Anibal is a fourth-year doctoral student in political science at UC Irvine. He aspires to become a professor to support and empower students of color through his research, pedagogy, and mentorship. Anibal is passionate about building and sustaining communities of care via the centering of marginalized populations.



Andrew Arevalo

Andrew Arevalo is a Filipino American and a third-year student at San Diego State University majoring in Sociology. He is a transfer student from San Diego Mesa College. His current favorite hobbies are video editing and creating montages, which allow him to look back at his favorite memories and relive them.



Bobby Whetstone

Bobby Whetstone An alumni of Cal State Dominguez Hills with a Business Administration, Finance degree, Bobby Whetstone is a tax professional currently pursuing a master's in taxation. His entrepreneurial journey spans from running a tax practice, Airbnb real estate projects, and starting a trucking company. Outside of business, Bobby loves to travel, explore different cultures food, and listen to hip-hop.





Brianna Harvey

Brianna Harvey is a scholar, practitioner, and Assistant Professor in the Department of Sociology at CSU Fullerton. Her interdisciplinary research examines the ways carceral systems utilize policies and practices to perpetuate anti-blackness and impact the lives of Black youth and their families. Dr. Harvey engages in community rooted qualitative inquiry that seeks to combat oppression by creating spaces of liberation. She received her Ph.D. in Education from UCLA, and her Master of Social Work degree from USC.



Daniel Jesus Grajeda

Daniel Jesus Grajeda is a proud community college and CSU system product. He is currently an adjunct faculty member at Norco College, where he developed and leads the Men of Color (MoC) Scholars program. Since the summer of 2020, Daniel has helped grow the program and incorporated dedicated peer mentors, an academic counselor, a success coach, a dedicated English professor, monthly cultural conversations, monthly social events, networking opportunities, general education classes, scholarship opportunities, and local college tours. Daniel received his A.A. from Norco College, his B.A. from Cal Poly Pomona and his M.S. in School Counseling from Cal Baptist University.



Dr. David C. Turner III

Dr. David C. Turner III is an Assistant Professor of Black Life and Racial Justice in the Department of Social Welfare at the Luskin School of Public Affairs at UCLA. He is also a faculty affiliate with the Ralph J. Bunche Center for African American Studies, and the Associate Director of the Million Dollar Hoods Project. He currently serves as the senior advisor to the Alliance for Boys and Men of Color - a national network of hundreds of community organizations working to build power and advance racial and gender justice. Dr. Turner has been featured in the Chronicle of Higher Education, NBC BLK, the Los Angeles Times, Spectrum 1 News, and the New York Times for his activism and applied scholarship.



Dr. Derrick R. Brooms

Dr. Derrick R. Brooms is the Executive Director of the Black Men's Research Institute and Professor of Africana Studies at Morehouse College; he is also a Senior Research Associate for the CSU YMOC Consortium and serves as a youth worker as well. His research primarily focuses on the lived experiences of Black boys and men, including their pathways to and through college, as well as Black and Latino men's college experiences.





Ethan Concepcion

Ethan Concepcion is half-CHamoru and half-Mexican. He is a third-year student at San Diego State University majoring in History. He is a transfer student from Southwestern College where he earned his A.A. degree in History. He was born and raised in Imperial Beach then moved to Otay Ranch for high school.



Eligio Martinez Jr.

Eligio Martinez Jr. is an assistant professor in the Educational Leadership Department at Cal Poly Pomona. For the past four years, he has served a Senior Research Associate with the California State University Young Males of Color Consortium working with CSU campus partners to develop and grow male success initiatives. His research focuses on the experiences of men of color throughout the education pipeline. Dr. Martinez is also a research affiliate with Project MALES at UT, Austin where he is part of a national research collaborative focused on men of color. Prior to his academic career, Dr. Martinez served as the coordinator for the Men of Color Mentoring Program at Tarrant County College in Fort Worth, TX.



George W. Parker IV

George W. Parker IV is the Assistant Director for CSU Long Beach's Men's Success Initiative, supporting undergraduate men of color in persisting toward graduation and achieving academic success. George is currently completing his Ed.D. at CSU Fullerton, focusing on men of color retention in student affairs within the Educational Leadership Program.
